Starting 2009 Laguna Water has brought significant changes in the water situation in the cities of Biñan, Sta. Rosa, and Cabuyao. Now, these areas enjoy 24/7 availability of safe, clean, and pressurized water.

Aspiring to make water accessible and available to all residents of Laguna, the company implements sustainable development programs, such as Tubig Para Sa Barangay and Lingap Eskwela, that enable low-income communities and schools to connect with Laguna Water's water supply network.

With the amendment of its concession agreement in June 2015, Laguna Water is now poised to provide water and used water services in the entire Province of Laguna.







Millions of people around the globe long for a convenient and reliable source of water, a source that can provide safe, clean, and uninterrupted water supply for everyday use.

Poor quality of water hinders economic growth and development and causes various societal problems relating to health, livelihood, and environment, among others. Hence, ensuring access to safe and clean water has been identified by the United Nations as one of the goals in achieving sustainable development.

In the Philippines, the cities of Biñan, Sta. Rosa, and Cabuyao in Laguna had experienced poor water situation. Plagued with poor water services and unsteady water supply, residents of these areas were using unsafe water from shallow wells or sharing water source with other households.







Having seen the need for a reliable partner in the provision of clean, safe, and uninterrupted water, Manila Water, through its subsidiary Manila Water Philippine Ventures (MWPV), took the challenge of improving the water situation in these areas. MWPV partnered with the Provincial Government of Laguna (PGL), which gave birth to Laguna Water.

With Laguna Water coming into the picture, the water situation in Biñan, Sta. Rosa, and Cabuyao has greatly improved.

Uplifting lives of people through the provision of water and used water services, Laguna Water's success has opened new opportunities for the company. In June 2015, Laguna Water and PGL signed the amendment of the former's concession agreement. The amendment authorizes Laguna Water to expand its water services from the original concession area to all the cities and municipalities within the Province of Laguna. Moreover, the amendment also allows Laguna Water to provide used water services and establish sewage and septage management systems in the Province.


Guided by its vision of empowering communities and providing clean water for all, Laguna Water, in partnership with the Manila Water Foundation, launched several water projects as part of its Sustainable Development Programs.

Tubig Para Sa Barangay: Safeguarding health in impoverished communities



In response to the growing concern of unreliable water sources and the heightening risks of water contamination, Laguna Water implemented a program that will ensure access to safe and clean water, the Tubig Para Sa Barangay (TPSB) or Water for the Community Program. Through TPSB, water connection fee of households with low financial capacity are subsidized and a favorable payment scheme is applied to relieve beneficiaries from heavy financial burden.

To date, more than 400 households from low-income communities have been connected to Laguna Water's water supply through TPSB



Lingap Eskwela: Improving access to clean water in public elementary schools

Lingap Eskwela or Water for Schools program was launched to address the lack of access of public elementary schools in Laguna to clean water and basic sanitation. Aiming to increase the learning ability and ensure good health and safety of students, Lingap Eskwela provides facilities, such as drinking fountains and handwashing areas, that give access to clean water and improve sanitary condition of schools.



Since its implementation in 2013, more than 20,000 students from 16 public schools in Laguna have benefited from the Lingap Eskwela Program



Sustainable Livelihood: The Kabuhayan Para Sa Barangay Program



Kabuhayan Para Sa Barangay (KPSB) or Livelihood for the Community is a program that grants non-interest bearing loan capital to registered livelihood cooperatives in the Province. With funding from Manila Water Foundation (MWF), chosen beneficiaries undergo capacity building activities to sharpen their skills. A systematic process of monitoring skillset development is done on a course of one year to assure sustainable improvement of KPSB beneficiaries.

A total of 4.5 million pesos of interest-free loan capital has been granted to 45 livelihood cooperatives in Laguna since 2013



With the continued support from the Provincial Government of Laguna and various local government units, agencies, and organizations, Laguna Water envisions to uplift more lives in the Province by making safe, clean, and potable water available and accessible to everyone.

SURGE OF EXCELLENCE

Laguna Water shines bright at the 51st Anvil Gabi ng Parangal

Laguna Water, the largest water and used water service provider in Laguna, received gold and silver recognitions for The Laguna Water Story and Lingap Eskwela, respectively, at the 51st Anvil Gabi ng Parangal.

The Laguna Water Story bagged a Gold Anvil Award for the compelling audio-visual presentation that encourages individuals and communities to join in the effort of ensuring reliable, sufficient and clean water supply for the Province of Laguna.

The video talks about the company's journey, from being a small water operator servicing 17,700 households within the cities of Biñan, Sta. Rosa, and Cabuyao to becoming the biggest water operator in Laguna with more than 112,000 customers.

A Silver Anvil Award was also given to Laguna Water's Lingap Eskwela (Clean Water for Schools program), one of the company's corporate social responsibility initiatives that provides public schools access to safe, clean and uninterrupted water supply via the provision of drinking fountains and handwashing facilities.

The Public Relations Society of the Philippines (PRSP) received more than 300 entries for the 51st Anvil Awards and 140 out of all the entries were recognized.

Raising Environmental Awareness and Responsibility

Laguna Water Drives Mobile Lakbayan and Toka Toka to Laguna

Knowing that a clean water system contributes to the sustainable development of the socio-economic and health and nutrition status of families in the Philippines, Laguna Water brings Manila Water's information, education, and communication (IEC) programs on the importance of proper used water management, *Mobile Lakbayan* and *Toka Toka*, to different cities and municipalities in Laguna: Calamba (March 19), Biñan (April 16), Sta. Rosa (April 24), and Cabuyao (April 30).

The Province of Laguna had experienced the adverse effects of environmental pollution. At the onslaught of super typhoon Yolanda back in 2013, many cities and municipalities in the Province were severely affected, leaving a number of towns and barangays submerged in floodwaters.

To help alleviate the disadvantageous effects of environmental degradation, Laguna Water raises environmental consciousness and responsibility of Lagunenses through Mobile Lakbayan and Toka-Toka.









Mobile Lakbayan presents the processes water undergoes before it comes out of household taps, after its use, and before it is discharged to bodies of water. It gives the public a clear understanding of the importance of using water wisely,

the urgency of reviving rivers and other water systems, and the need to protect the watersheds and the environment.

In conjunction with Mobile Lakbayan, the Toka Toka program solicits cooperative volunteerism across different sectors of the society to do their share in ensuring that safe and clean water systems will be available to all. This advocacy program encourages people to pledge simple acts for the environment such as proper disposal of wastes and cleaning of septic tank (desludging) on a five to seven-year cycle.



Through Mobile Lakbayan and Toka-Toka, more than 2,500 Lagunenses have already been educated with the importance of proper used water management and have also committed to help save and rehabilitate rivers and water systems in Laguna. As steward of the environment, Laguna Water will be bringing these environmental programs to more cities and municipalities in Laguna.

USED WATER

When it goes down the drain, where does it go?

Used water from flushing the toilet, bathing, washing the dishes and general cleaning goes down the drain and into a pipe.

Screening

removal of solid wastes (diapers, plastics, face wipes, among others) prior to entering the main lift station

Grit Removal

removal of grits (smaller solid waste components) like hair and sand

Water is essential to life. It is used everyday – to cook, take a bath, flush the toilet, wash the dishes and do laundry, among many other things. But where does all of the used water go when it comes running down the drain?

Used water coming from toilets (black water) and kitchens (grey water) is commonly referred to as domestic wastewater. It is in contrast to industrial wastewater which is mainly composed of water used in industrial processes. Upon discharge to drains, untreated domestic wastewater may overflow from septic tanks into drain fields that could either flow into bodies of water or seep through water tables (layer of soil saturated with water), which could lead to common water-borne diseases like diarrhea, typhoid fever and cholera.

Diseases and ailments caused by dirty water can be prevented by having well-maintained sewage facilities and by having the water treated prior to its discharge to waterways.

As one of its steps to help prevent, if not alleviate, health-related problems in Laguna due to direct discharge of untreated wastewater, Laguna Water has taken over and improved the operations of the Sewage Treatment Plant (STP) in Laguna Technopark Incorporated (LTI) since 2014.

Used water from industrial plants and office tenants, through the sewer network, flows into LTI STP where it undergoes treatment prior to its discharge into the Sta. Rosa River. Meanwhile, the separated solids called sludge are dewatered and used as organic fertilizer.



In 2014, Laguna Water took over the water and used water operations of Laguna Technopark Inc., a 450-hectare industrial zone in Sta.Rosa and Biñan housing more than 220 local and global industrial companies

Upon discharge into bodies of water, the treated wastewater undergoes the natural process of water cycle and is eventually used again as water supply.

As water users, everyone has a responsibility in ensuring efficient treatment of used water. Simple tasks like proper solid waste management to prevent clogging of sewer lines and drainages and correct installation of pipelines and septic tanks are practices everyone should be conscious of. *Remember, when it goes down the drain, it goes back to its users.*

Michelle Landicho shares how Laguna Water made a difference in Gawad Kalinga Village Sta.Rosa

No more waiting in line, no more heated arguments, and no more unnecessary expenditure of strength and efforts. Life has been more colorful.

"Mas madali ngayon, hindi na nahihirapan ang anak ko sa pag-iigib," said Michelle Landicho when asked how Laguna Water significantly helps her family and the Gawad Kalinga (GK) Village in having safe, clean and reliable water supply.

Michelle, a mother of three, is one of the beneficiaries of a housing project located at Brgy. Pulong Sta. Cruz, Sta. Rosa City.

"Noong wala pa ang Laguna Water, ang hirap talaga ng tubig. Pahirapan sa pag-igib. Mag-aalala ka pa na baka magkasakit ka," Michelle uttered.

Behind the colorful houses is a community that has long endured the unreliable water quality they get from shallow wells.

Residents had also suffered from the daily dose of back pain and exhaustion due to the need of transporting pails of water to their respective homes. There were instances when fights broke out among neighbors while waiting in line because there was only one established shallow well in a community of around 200 families.

"Talagang tiyaga ka maghintay. Ang haba ng pila. 'Yung iba madaling araw pa lang umiigib na sa dami ng taong gagamit ng tubig,"she added.

It was in November 2015 when Laguna Water started servicing GK Village. Each home now has access to clean, safe, and 24/7 water.

"Pangarap ko na makapagtapos ang mga anak ko, hindi kasi ako nakapag-aral ng kolehiyo," Michelle shared. As she realized her dream of having her own house with a reliable source of water, Michelle is confident that soon all her dreams will become reality.

True to Manila Water Chairman Fernando Zobel De Ayala's statement, "a mission to fulfill, not a business to run," Laguna Water is committed to make life more colorful by being a reliable partner in providing exceptional water and used water service.

Ginhawa Craft Studio and Asian Art Cafe is an art cafe that helps artists from Los Baños and neighboring provinces promote their artworks and other creations.

Located inside the country's premiere university, the University of the Philippines Los Baños, Ginhawa treats its customers with a beautiful ambiance surrounded by trees. It also makes use of the university's fallen wood from past typhoons which were converted into aesthetically appealing sculptures and furniture.


